HOMELESSNESS PROGRAM MANAGER

Position Purpose:

Advance County's efforts to address homelessness

Responsibilities:

- Collaborate with entities and individuals seeking to address homelessness including:
 - Public, private, non-profit, philanthropic, and social service agencies;
 - Faith based, healthcare, and veterans' service organizations;
 - · Law enforcement, jail and criminal support staff; and
 - Community volunteers.
- Coordinate and connect resources and services that address homelessness and are intended to achieve functional zero homelessness.
- Implement strategies outlined in the National Alliance to End Homelessness' Within Reach study, and subsequent homelessness studies, using resources the County controls and allocates.
- Provide quarterly Continuum of Care updates to Board of Commissioners
- Serve as liaison to the Continuum of Care



CODE PURPLE

• Purpose:

- Provide a coordinated effort among shelters and other organizations within Buncombe County to provide emergency shelter to those experiencing homelessness when temperatures are <32° (including windchill).
- Participating shelters provide more beds with fewer requirements than typical programming during Code Purple.

Partners:

- Homeless Coalition
- Asheville Buncombe Community Christian Ministries (ABCCM)
- City of Asheville Transit
- FY23 Impact: 68 Code Purple events resulted in 3,519 bed nights
- FY 24 Annual Budget: \$120,000 (\$60,000 Buncombe County and \$60,000 City of Asheville)
- FY 24 Next Steps: Preliminary planning for FY24 (Winter 23-24)

VAYA HEALTH MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT (MOE) FUNDS

According to N.C.G.S. § 122C-115(d) counties shall appropriate funds for the support of programs that provide MH/IDD/SU services to people who do not have insurance or who are not eligible for Medicaid.

- **Program:** Homeward Bound Coordinated Entry & Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)
- Target Population and Eligibility:
 - Coordinated Entry for individuals and families currently unhoused or are at risk of being unhoused with a formal written notice to vacate, history of homelessness or instability in the past seven (7) years and that are below certain income levels.
 - **Permanent Supportive Housing** for individuals who have been homeless for a year or more and living with at least one disabling condition, physical, severe and persistent mental illness, or substance use disorder.
- FY23 Impact (as of March 2023):
 - Coordinated Entry
 - Pre-screen Intakes = 1,010
 - Diversion Assessments = 786
 - Vulnerability Assessments = 655
 - 66% had a vulnerability score recommending PSH
 - 33% had a vulnerability score recommending Rapid Re-Housing
 - Moved into housing = 24
- **FY24 Budget:** \$430,000
- FY 24 Next Steps: Process for allocating Vaya Health MOE funds will be re-evaluated to align with County Strategic Plans

- Permanent Supportive Housing
 - Serving >240 households
 - Overall housing retention rate = 93%



COMMUNITY PARAMEDICNE

Program: Buncombe County provides a community centered approach to facing issues around homelessness, the opioid epidemic, and mental health crisis head on. Through meaningful agency collaborations, person centered wrap around care, and harm reduction principles we continue to redefine public safety in a way that prioritizes life-saving care through trust in our community.

- Post Overdose Response
- Buncombe Bridge to Care (Medications for Opioid Use Disorder)
- Mobile Community Outreach Team
- Wound Care
- Crisis Response

FY23 Impact:

- CY22: Paramedics responded to 3,702 calls with 983 overdoses with 60% of calls after 5pm and with 38% of overdoses completing an intake for ongoing support.
- 03/22 01/23: 185 individuals inducted onto Bup; 145 were successfully handed off to MAHEC for continued MAT

FY24 Budget: \$3,102,453 (supported by a combination of general and opioid settlement funds as well as an ARPA Grant)

LIBRARY OUTREACH

Program: Library Safety Associate and Homeward Bound Library-based Part-time Social Worker Positions. Pack Library has many regular patrons who are dealing with housing insecurity and related concerns. Both positions are available to help any library visitor, we expect that a large percentage of their time will be spent assisting these patrons.

Part-time Social Worker:

- Placed through an ongoing partnership with Homeward Bound
- Works to connect library visitors with affordable housing options, medical care, referrals to other area agencies, and additional needs.

Library Safety Associate:

• Supports the community at large by assisting with immediate intervention needs, safety and security concerns, relationship building, and resource referrals.

Target Population: Supporting and providing services to the many visitors to Pack Memorial Library in downtown Asheville.

FY23 Impact: Social worker at Pack Library assisted multiple individuals in obtaining safe and reliable housing in FY23. Over 80 clients were also directly served through on-site services.

FY24 Budget: \$34,739 for Library Safety Associate; \$70,525 for Homeward Bound Partnership

Next Steps: The Library Safety Association position will begin in January 2024.

- 4. Support activities that achieve functional zero Homelessness
- 5. Support activities that encourage the use of all vouchers





AFFORABLE HOUSING OBJECTIVES

Buncombe County will impact 2,800-3,150 affordable housing units by 2030.


- 1,500-1,850 rental units for households at ≤ 80% AMI
 - average at ≤ 60% AMI across all households
 - 1,200-1,480 units should leverage the LIHTC program (will leverage an estimated \$100 \$120 million in tax credit equity to Buncombe Co.)
 - 200 units for <30% AMI
- 400 ownership units for households at ≤ 80% AMI
- 500 repair units for households at ≤ 80% AMI
- 400 ownership or rental units for households at > 80% to ≤ 120% AMI

RENTAL UNITS FOR HOUSEHOLDS AT <80% AMI







RENTAL UNITS LEVERAGING LIHTC




RENTAL UNITS FOR HOUSEHOLDS AT <30%
